Seize Two Villages in Arab Nazareth Defense Ring; Tel Aviv Raided by Night

With the central Palestine front
stabilized, Israeli troops went on
the offensive in central Galilee
today and Shafa 'Amr, largest
Arab village of the Nazareth defense ring, fell after a brisk struggle.

The assault, which started in the early morning darkness, appeared to be the beginning of a drive against the Arab forces under Fawzi Kaukji, which have been engaged in marauding activities for weeks from their main base in the Christian holy city of Nazareth. areth.

Shafa 'Amr, which is on the main highway from Nazareth to Acre-Haifa, was hit from the west while Ein Mahil, an Arab village east of Nazareth, was captured simultaneously by a separate Jewish force. force.

The two-pronged attack almost completed the ring around Nazareth, and the objective of the drive seemed to be seizure of the hills overlooking the greatest city of central Galilee. Because of its religious importance to Christianity, Nazareth has been spared from direct assault.
