

MOSLEM SAGES ASK HOLY WAR AS DUTY

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demned the United Nations' resolution for partition and said it was "passed by an organization which does not have the competence to pass it." Partition was described as "unjust toward Arabs' rights."

Demonstrations formed in Cairo's streets on the Egyptian Arabs' third day of protests. One demonstration, composed of 2,000 workers, formed in a slum district and marched on Abdin Palace. It was followed closely by three truckloads of armed police to prevent disorders.

The demonstrators shouted anti-American, anti-Zionist, anti-Russian and anti-United Nations slogans, interspersed with cheers for Palestine's Arabs.

Guards were strengthened outside legations and embassies. Banks, shops and bars closed their shutters. Windows were smashed in a Greek bar. A number of other shops damaged by the demonstrators also belonged to Greeks. Greece was the only European nation that voted against partition.

Students from the American University in Cairo marched to the Arab League offices, shouting "Down With America."

The destruction prompted the Premier, Mahmoud Fahmy Nok-rashy Pasha, to announce that all demonstrations would be banned in the future. Abdul Rahman Az-zam Pasha, the Arab League's secretary, told the students that those who wished to fight would be able to do so when the moment came and that those who wished to participate in the struggle by other means would also receive orders.

Students of the Moslem Theological Institute in Alexandria demonstrated, demanding that they receive military training so they could fight. They also demanded that diplomatic relations be broken with nations supporting partition.

Azzam Pasha praised Christian Arabs, "among whom," he said, "I know no traitors and who are foremost in defense of the Arab cause in Palestine." American Christians "seem to have forsaken Christianity for dollars" and are giving away their holy places to Zionists, he added.

John S. Badeau, president of the American University, said in reply to a telegram from 100 students:

"I personally deplore deeply the action of the United Nations, for I believe the partition of Palestine is unjust to Arabs and will not solve the problem of displaced persons."

He added, however, that university policy was to keep out of political movements.

dents here, condemned indiscriminate incidents. He said respect for law and order was one thing and war against the Zionists another.

He asked the students not to molest Jews.

British Institute Burned

JERUSALEM, Dec. 2 (Reuters)—One thousand demonstrators tossed flaming torches into the British Institute in Zagazig, Egypt, and burned the building, a dispatch from Alexandria reported today. The library was consumed in a bonfire and the Egyptian secretary was injured.

More than 2,000 Alexandria textile workers who struck in sympathy with Palestinian Arabs returned to work later in the day when threatened with loss of pay.

Anti-Jewish Riots in Syria

DAMASCUS, Syria, Dec. 2 (P)—A mob in Aleppo broke into the Jewish quarter today, attacking restaurants, clubs and shops and burning goods. There also were demonstrations in Homs and Hama, but Damascus, the capital, was quiet, although an Arab general strike was in force. The Chamber of Deputies adjourned after a special session of nine hours at which the Palestine question was debated. A bill for compulsory military service was referred to a special committee, and the Government was authorized to pay

£2,000,000 (\$920,000) from the reserve fund as the first installment of an assessment by the Arab League for the "liberation" of Palestine.

Beirut Protest Is Peaceable

BEIRUT, Lebanon, Dec. 2 (P)—Demonstrators protesting a partitioning of Palestine paraded through the streets today for the second successive day. There were no immediate reports of violence.

Iraqi Protest "Tyranny"

BAGHDAD, Iraq, Dec. 2 (P)—A United States Army sergeant and his wife were pulled from a jeep and molested by an Arab mob today as demonstrations against the Palestine decision continued.

The Americans were forced against a wall by a throng and threatened by fists but were released uninjured. [A United Press dispatch identified the couple as Sgt. and Mrs. John Van Vacter of Shelbyville, Mo.]

All traffic was halted in Baghdad, and business establishments closed down as 70,000 demonstrators milled. The demonstrators, who grew fiercer after dark, shouted protests of the "imperialism" of the United States, Russia, Britain and France and the "tyranny" of the United Nations.

Six Communists were arrested while distributing leaflets.

Three groups of demonstrators,

one composed entirely of women, reached the confines of the royal palace, where the Director of the Royal Council told them: "Prepare for sacrifices. The Regent is not less enthusiastic. Your Government will soon need you."

Pakistani Pledges Aid

LAHORE, Pakistan, Dec. 2 (Reuters)—Pakistan will "fight shoulder to shoulder with its Arab brethren to defend the Holy Land," Ghazanfar Ali Khan, Minister for Refugees, told Moslem workers today.
