U. N. Interim Rule Likely In Palestine

LAKE SUCCESS, May 8 (AP)-Top United Nations delegates were reported tonight generally agreed en creating an emergency regime for Palestine.

Sentiment for a provisional administration for the Holy Land was said authoritatively to have crystalized after long meetings among the delegates.

The special U. N. Assembly on Palestine is working against time. The British plan to give up the Palestine mandate at midnight Friday. The Assembly is trying to shape up at least a token organization to fill the vacuum created by the British action.

It is realized here such an organization would have only the moral force of the U. N. to back it up.

Finn Moe, Norway's delegate to the Assembly, was assigned the task of drawing up over the week end concrete proposals for a 12-nation subcommittee of the Assembly to consider.

Moe said he would list the points on which the delegates are agreed and on which they are not agreed so that the subcommittee will have something definite to work on at its next meeting Monday morning.

The Arab Higher Committee was reported to have suggested three names to the U. N. for the proposed post of neutral Mayor (Commissioner) of Jerusalem.

Egypt Volunteers Reported Across

Palestine Frontier

CAIRO, May 8 (AP)-The "Command Volunteers, southern front Palestine" issued a communique today saving volunteer Egyptian forces had penetrated about 30 miles into the Holy Land.

"Our forces penertated the fron-

tiers and held their posts without casualties," said the communique. "Some forces rushed to the northern part of the front to help Arabs repulsing Jewish attacks on Iraq Suweidan, some 50 kilometers north of the Egyptian border town of Rafa. This help was successful.

eler returning from a tour of the southern Palestine desert confirmed the presence of 500 Egyptian volunteers at Falujia and Irag Suweidan northeast of Gaza. The traveler said the volunteers were commanded by "Egyptian army officers," and apparently were well trained and well armed.)

A considerable but unknown number of regular Egyptian army officers and soldiers have recently been given leave from the army and joined the volunteers under special inducements offered by the government and Arab League.
