The commission drafted a letter to British Delegate Sir Alexander Cadogan. The letter said the commission would find it impossible to carry out its duties of administering the partition of Palestine unless it was allowed to enter the Holy Land

earlier than two weeks before the British mandate ends. The British have announced that they will give up control of Pales-

tine about May 15.
