

FOUR JEWS GET LIFE IN PALESTINE FIGHT

miles east of Haifa. Two Arabs were killed and six injured. The attackers' casualties were not known.

The day's total casualties reported by the police were one Arab found dead near Safad, three killed when Jews passing in a car threw a bomb in Sarafind, one dead when Jews, attacked in a bus in the Sheikh Jarrah quarter of Jerusalem, returned the fire and two in the Tamra attack. Seven Arabs and three Jews were wounded.

No British circles here put any stock in newspaper stories of a British withdrawal from the Holy Land ahead of schedule. The British cannot afford complete anarchy in Palestine while they still have a considerable number of persons here.

If they were willing to abandon huge stores, the British could pull out their forces in a fortnight. If they decide at any time to do so, this country faces chaos.

Jews Press Mobilization

JERUSALEM, Jan. 19 (AP)—The office of the chief of Jewish mobilization announced tonight that all Jewish men and women in Palestine between 25 and 40 would be enrolled in defense work by Feb. 1.

The announcement said that Jewish students being graduated from high school or college would no longer be permitted to leave the Holy Land for advanced study, because all available strength was needed here in the fight against the Arabs.

Jewish and Arab workers clashed on the crowded docks in Haifa today. Military sources said one Jew was stabbed to death.

An informant at the United State Consulate said that the Consul General in Jerusalem was keeping the State Department "fully informed" of activities of former American soldiers of Jewish faith who were students at universities in Palestine and taking part in the Holy Land fighting.

Sources close to the Palestine Government said that the British Army surplus goods office here had agreed to sell twenty-one used Auster scout planes to the Jewish Agency for Palestine. The office also has agreed to sell other military equipment to the Agency, including barbed wire and light reconnaissance cars, the sources said.

Sixty-five Ex-GI's in Haganah

JERUSALEM, Jan. 19 (UP)—The Jewish Agency for Palestine said today that sixty-five Americans attending school in Palestine under the GI Bill of Rights had enlisted in the Haganah.

The commander of the Haganah, a former colonel in the British Army, said at a secret headquarters that his troops "dominate every road, every path leading in and out of Jaffa" and would cut off and hold as hostages 100,000 Arabs if there was any massacre of Jews in isolated settlements in the north or south.

The commander said that the Jews were preparing for a war of at least a year with the Arabs but that the fighting would probably last three or four years.

A masked band of members of Irgun Zvai Leumi, terrorist organization, robbed the Maspero cigarette factory, near Tel Aviv, of 2,000,000 cigarettes in daylight. Members of the Haganah tracked the trucks down and, after what was described as a "fist fight," took 1,500,000 cigarettes and carried them back to the factory.

Moscow Charges U. S. Design

LONDON, Jan. 19 (AP)—The Moscow radio quoting two Bucharest newspapers, said tonight that the United States was sponsoring an "immediate" military alliance of Greece and Turkey which eventually would bring United States military bases to the Greek island of Lemnos in the Aegean Sea. The Bucharest reports described Lemnos as dominating the approaches to the Dardanelles, the Moscow radio said.
